


Water-Nymph

HE publishers take pleasure in announcing the publication of a new Method of instruction in organ-playing by Edward Shippen Barnes, entitled, "School of Organ-Playing." This book is intended to supply all the material necessary for the beginner for the first year or two of his study, and will also be found useful for those of more advanced attainments who may wish to review the points of style necessary to the greatest excellence of performance on the organ. The use of this volume requires no other preparation than some knowledge of the piano.

Mr. Edward Shippen Barnes, whose reputation as a composer, editor and organist is well known, acquired a considerable portion of his musical education at the "Schola Cantorum" in Paris, a school founded by Vincent d'Indy. Being deeply impressed with the excellence of the organ instruction at this school, Mr. Barnes conceived the idea of incorporating in one volume the course of organ instruction as he received it there, together with a careful assortment of exercises and pieces chosen from those in use at the school and those which he has found of the greatest benefit to his pupils in his private teaching. The result of his careful and exhaustive work is this "School of Organ-Playing."

This volume is founded upon the Method of J. Lemmens—perhaps the most celebrated teacher of the organ who ever lived—and who numbered among his pupils such famous men as Charles-Marie Widor and the late Alexandre Guilmant. Lemmens' Method is a very large and expensive book, and the material necessary to supplement it (the works of Bach being the logical accessories

for the serious-minded student) makes the total outlay very considerable. Mr. Barnes has presented in this one volume all that is vital, both for exercises and further study-material.

The book, which has been constructed with the utmost care and research, and whose compilation has occupied some years, may, we believe, be considered the last word in modern organteaching, and it aims to give the student a thorough foundation of style in the least possible time. Its system of procedure is different from that of any former Method, the book being arranged after the following novel and practical plan:

The essential principles of organ-playing are clearly set forth in numbered paragraphs, and at the close of each explanation of a vital principle there are grouped a number of examples taken from various organ-works, showing at once, in actual performance, the application of the principle described. The pupil is then referred by number to the appropriate exercises, which are grouped at the end of the explanatory section. The Manuals are first treated in this manner (and form incidentally in this section, a complete method for Harmonium), then the Pedals follow, and finally the combination of Manuals and Pedals. The volume ends with a careful selection from the many volumes of Bach's works.

The pupil will, upon completion of this book, have obtained an excellent foundation in organplaying, and a habit of care and good taste which will be invaluable in his future development. No essential principle of any method is omitted, and yet the work is made as concise as possible.

Mr. Wallace Goodrich, Dean of the faculty of the New England Conservatory of Music, has given this work his highest indorsement, and has provided a masterly introduction which no student should fail to read.
